

# LARRY D. NEAL

Larry Neal is Emeritus Professor of Economics at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Research Associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research, and Visiting Professor at the London School of Economics. He received his B. A. in History at Stanford University and Ph. D. in Economics from the University of California at Berkeley.

Professor Neal has been the recipient of fellowships from the Alexander von Humboldt Stiftung when he visited the University of Paderborn in Germany, as well as the John Simon Guggenheim Foundation and the Fulbright Commission when he visited The London School of Economics and Political Science. In 1999-2000, he served as President of the Economic History Association and as President of the Business History Conference. He is the Founding Director of the European Union Center at the University of Illinois, one of ten such centers funded in the United States by the European Commission in 1998.

Professor Neal is the author of numerous books, publications and articles, including the books, *The Economics of Europe and the European Union*, Cambridge and New York: Cambridge University Press; *A Concise Economic History of the World, from Paleolithic Times to the Present*, (with Rondo Cameron), 4th edition, New York: Oxford University Press; *The Economics of the European Union and the Economies of Europe*, (with Daniel Barbezat), New York: Oxford University Press; and *The Rise of Financial Capitalism*, Cambridge and New York, Cambridge University Press.

Professor Neal's research interests included monetary and financial history, European economic history and the economics of the European Union. His current work includes: A Comparative Historical Study of the Microstructure of Secondary Securities Markets (with Lance Davis (CalTech) and Eugene White (Rutgers)); NSF through the NBER; Risk Management in the First Emerging Markets (with Ann Carlos, University of Colorado); NSF, collaborative effort with U. of Colorado; and European Union Center at the University of Illinois European Commission. This Center focuses on current policy issues that are contentious between the EU and the US, including non-tariff trade barriers, monetary policy, and expansion into east and central Europe.
